How to Have a Quiet Time

Why Have a Quiet Time?

- To enjoy fellowship with God and get to know Him better (Phil. 3:8-10; Matt. 22:37,38).
- To delight God (Proverbs 15:8b).
- To discover principles to direct our lives (Psalm 119:105).
- To develop perspectives on life from God's point of view (Romans 12:2).

Practical Suggestions:

Set aside a regular time each day to spend with God and make it a daily priority.

Find a quiet place where you can be alone and free from distractions. (Mark 1:35)

Come with an attitude of expectancy and a hunger to meet God. (Luke 10:38-42)

Quiet Time Ideas

Use the ACTS acrostic during your quiet time

A=Adoration:

Spend time praising the Lord by praying the Psalms back to Him (Psalm 28:7 & 100:4).

Sing hymns, listening to a praise tape or praise Him for His attributes.

C=Confession:

Ask God to search your heart (Psalm 139:23,24). Confess any sins the Holy Spirit reveals to you (Psalm. 66:18, I John 1:9). Make certain that you're filled with the Spirit (Ephesians 5:15-20).

T=Thanksgiving:

Thank God for all that He's done and is doing in your life and the lives of others. Write a list of what you're thankful for.

S=Supplication:

Pray for specific things each day such as personal concerns, family, upcoming events, friends, missionaries, etc. Write down your requests so you'll have a record of God's guidance and faithfulness.

Spend time in the Word

- Have a schedule for your daily reading and read slowly and thoughtfully.
- Ask questions about how it relates to your life.
- Reread and substitute your name in appropriate places addressing the passage to God. Try this using Philippians 2:13.
- Occasionally read out loud.
- Record your thoughts and the verses that stand out to you in a notebook.

Action Point: Select a definite time and place for your quiet time for each day of the next week. Start with a short period of time that's comfortable for you. Try 10 to 15 minutes.

Staff Training: Monday: The Kingdom Comes!

This year we are going to walk through the gospels. Hopefully on our way through we will see some new and thought provoking words that Jesus has to say, some interesting actions and people surrounding Him, as well as hear His thoughts on how He sees the kingdom of heaven.

We will try to follow His life chronologically as much as possible- jumping back and forth between the various texts. I found it interesting to note what kinds of things were shared as well as omitted by each of the authors. You will find that many of the accounts in John's gospel are found only there. I would encourage you as you have time to investigate each of the different writers and some of the variations between their purposes & styles in writing! On Fridays there will be a section to record verses/stories that speak about either the gospel or the kingdom.

Staff Training: Sunday

Some Sunday's I am going to share a story (in addition to the reading Bekah has prepared) that one of the Leadership staff (past & present) have shared about their lives- struggles & growing. They have shared to encourage you and you seek to grow. 2 Corinthians 1:3-7.

Monotony can seem like a dreadful thing. We as humans are bound by time, change, and we often believe that if something isn't changing, it's dead. Yet, with God, this is false. God is alive and constant (!) continually rising and setting the sun. Like a child who over enjoys a game or a joke and says, "Do it again", I believe God tells the sun "Do it again". Fields of daisies created individually yet similar are beautiful celebrating in praising their creator. Celebrate in the consistency of God. Everyday God keeps these things in motion, and in an instant He could bring it to a stop. I have been learning about the walls that have bared me within myself. I believe one of the greatest sins among Christians, is keeping behind the walls, and refraining from being vulnerable with the body. Celebrate in the beauty of camp, the nature, and the sun rising and setting; God keeping all things in motion. Celebrate in the beauty of friendship, and the brotherhood and sisterhood of the people we are serving alongside.

This helps give some context to Jesus saying “I am the light of the world”..

Also during the feast, large jars of water would be poured out in the temple area for worship.

Giving context to Jesus saying “if anyone is thirsty let him come to me and drink...”

During these chapters, what is the tone of Jesus’ teaching?

What stands out to you the most?

What do you think happened when they tried to seize Him but were unable to? This is a funny picture to me!

I have always hated revealing my weaknesses, even in such trivial ways as accepting help from others. Shame and squirming, patronized fear flood my stomach—I want to bury my head in the sand until the person forgets about me.

So it is with God. I would rather hide my broken places and areas of unwholeness (which he knows about anyway): my guilt, greed, anger, shame, anxieties, selfishness. I don't want my dirt to be revealed before I scrub first. There is a word for this: pride.

I've come to realize that by not owning my own sin, I have no need for grace. I can never live fully and joyfully into who God intends for me to be by living that way. But when I stand before God with all that I am—not just the parts that I think he wants to see—then I am in a position to be healed, to accept love

I have struggled for years feeling 'small'. When I would be in a room with people my age I would feel very insignificant, like I was not only physically small in comparison to everyone- but also that my thoughts & ideas were of little value. It has been a long process with the Lord- learning how He sees me, really believing that is true of me and letting it shape how I think and act. Man, a long process- but I am so glad He keeps growing me, healing my wounds and fears, healing my spirit.

My hope was in nearly everything, but the Lord. This was after having been a Christian for many years. The craziest thing is that I didn't even realize consciously that I had put my own plan and comfort ahead of him. Thankfully, God loves us too much to let that go on without a fight. I've learned that God is seriously jealous for our attention and will do what is needed to return the intimacy he intended for us to have with him. So, eventually the bottom fell out from beneath me in major life changing ways. All of those people, ideas, positions, jobs, or conceptions that I put in God's place legitimately went away and I felt like I was worth nothing in this world because I had wrapped my whole identity and around them. So. Sad. Depression ensued for many many months. I would be lying in

bed with tears streaming down my face and feel a darkness encroaching upon me that was physically heavy. It was the loneliest time of my life. A good friend from camp had told me about one of his darkest times and that he would read through Psalm 143 over and over again in hopes that the morning would truly "bring word of [his] unfailling love, for I have put my trust in [him]". I would read the chapter on those horrible nights when the darkness would move, and I felt protection reading the cries of David to God. I know God answered my cries. I could feel his love and kind words comfort in my heart. He was there. Its been quite a few months since those dark days, and my heart has healed tremendously. I now have a conversational intimacy with him that I never knew could exist, and I see now that the whole point of everything he's done from the covenants, sending Jesus, giving us the spirit as counselor, and allowing the words of the apostles and other saints to be recorded is all for the sake of the deepest, passionate, and truest relationship any of us could ever imagine. Some of you may be going through some hard times this summer, and I would ask you this question--what is God after in allowing this to happen? More than likely it is reestablishing himself on the throne in the temple of our hearts or training us for the kingdom he's preparing. Go to him with your hard times. Open up a place for him to be invited as your hope, and he will surely come. May you find that the hard times you face are truly spectacular because your father cares for you. When I feel like I need God desperately, it is often in the night, in the dark when I am not sleeping, but thinking and thinking, tormented by my reliance on my self instead of on God to figure things out or to handle situations in life. I have learned that to rely on God is to be free of this kind of torment. I often find my self re-relying over and over during the night, but God has taught me so much through his comfort. When I am at my worst and turn to God, I picture that scene in one of the Narnia movies when Lucy sees Aslan in the clearing in the woods at night and she goes up to him and lies down with her hands and face in his mane and they talk. I think of this and pray, picturing myself holding on to God with both of my hands and burying my face in his comfort and power. And I go through in my mind what I know he has told me, usually thinking over who He says He is. Words like, Mighty God, Prince of Peace, Everlasting Father, Great Counselor etc. And just lie there in my mind in the woods in the shadow of His wings, and a peace that passes all understanding is present in my mind and heart. It has brought me to tears, but I don't ever want to be in a place where I am not relying on Him like this ever again in my life. I love it, it has made Him so real to me.
