On the next few pages, take time to read about Lectio Divina as well as some guidelines for how to start having devotions. This will help you as we launch into this book!

We will also be memorizing the Navigators A-pack of verses. As we meditate on and hide God's word in our hearts and minds, He brings it to our thoughts when it applies to the situation we are facing. We will be helping each other learn and holding each other accountable.

With so many things competing for our time and energy (at camp this summer and in our lives during the school year), it takes practice to involve the Holy Spirit in all of our day and to be aware and listening to Him. This takes effort for all of us, no matter what age we are. We are all on the same path!

Our prayer is that together we will "know God" in a more intimate way as the summer goes along. "We understand what wind is by feeling it blow in our face. We know what snow is like when we make a snowball or watch snowflakes collect on our mittens. This sort of knowing transcends the intellectual; it is direct, sensate and experiential. We want to challenge all of us to this kind of knowing.

Lectio divina (a posture of approach and encounter with a text that helps the text become a place of life changing transformation between us & God) is Latin for “sacred reading.” You might think of it as devotional reading. The goal is different than informational reading (reading to get information). It is important to read the Bible for information; there are facts and truth that God wants us to know. But it is also good to read the Bible to experience God because in the end God is the One who changes us.

God’s word teaches us:

“Be still and know that I am God.” Psalms 46:10 (NIV 1984)

“Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him.” Psalms 37:7 (NIV 1984)

“But I have calmed and quieted my soul,

like a weaned child with its mother;

like a weaned child is my soul within me.” Psalms 131:2 (ESV)

So we are commanded to be still. But do you ever take time to do so before the Lord? I don’t just mean to sit still. Do you ever “quiet your soul” before the Lord? Lectio divina is a means by which Christians historically did so. It was traditionally made up of five movements:

Silence – Stop. Come into God’s presence. Relax and try to let go of whatever is on your mind.

Read – Read a short passage of Scripture. Read it slowly and out loud. Don’t feel the need to read it straight through. Linger on any word(s) or phrase(s) that catch your attention. Listen for any invitation that God is extending to you in this passage. Reflect on the importance of the word(s)/phrase(s) that God brings to your attention.

Meditate – Read the passage a second time out loud. Savor the words like your favorite drink from Starbucks. Listen for any invitation God is extending to you through His word.

Speak – Respond/pray. Read the passage a 3rd time. This time enter into a personal dialogue with God. There is really no right or wrong way to do this. The important thing is to respond truthfully/authentically. What feelings has the passage awakened in you? Name where you are resistant or want to push back. Talk to God about these feelings.

Contemplate – Contemplate, rest, and wait in the presence of God. Allow some time for the word(s) to sink deeply into your soul. Does God have a word or phrase to take with you and remember throughout your day?

In the past couple of summers, we have focused on various ways to pray through scripture: using the 10 commandments, using the Lord's prayer and using the beatitudes.

This summer, we are going to focus on meditation through scripture memory. We are going to use the Navigators system of verses and we will start in their "A-pack". We will do about 2 verses/week together! We hope this is an encouragement to you.

How to Have a Quiet Time

Why Have a Quiet Time?

- To enjoy fellowship with God and get to know Him better (Phil. 3:8-10; Matt. 22:37,38).
- To delight God (Proverbs 15:8b).
- To discover principles to direct our lives (Psalm 119:105).
- To develop perspectives on life from God's point of view (Romans 12:2).

Practical Suggestions:

Set aside a regular time each day to spend with God and make it a daily priority. Find a quiet place where you can be alone and free from distractions. (Mark 1:35)

Come with an attitude of expectancy and a hunger to meet God. (Luke 10:38-42)

Quiet Time Ideas

Use the ACTS acrostic during your quiet time

A=Adoration:

Spend time praising the Lord by praying the Psalms back to Him (Psalm 28:7 & 100:4).

Sing hymns, listening to a praise tape or praise Him for His attributes.

C=Confession:

Ask God to search your heart (Psalm 139:23,24). Confess any sins the Holy Spirit reveals to you (Psalm.

66:18, I John 1:9). Make certain that you're filled with the Spirit (Ephesians 5:15-20).

T=Thanksgiving:

Thank God for all that He's done and is doing in your life and the lives of others.

Write a list of what you're thankful for.

S=Supplication:

Pray for specific things each day such as personal concerns, family, upcoming events, friends, missionaries, etc. Write down your requests so you'll have a record of God's guidance and faithfulness.

Spend time in the Word

- Have a schedule for your daily reading and read slowly and thoughtfully.
- Ask questions about how it relates to your life.
- Reread and substitute your name in appropriate places addressing the passage to God. Try this using Philippians 2:13.
- Occasionally read out loud.
- Record your thoughts and the verses that stand out to you in a notebook.

Action Point: Select a definite time and place for your quiet time for each day of the next week. Start with a short period of time that's comfortable for you. Try 10 to 15 minutes.

Staff Training

These beginning chapters may be very familiar- but try to read it slowly and really take in the enormity of what is taking place. Let the Holy Spirit teach you about creation.

The Hebrew word for created (bara) refers to something brought from nothing- an act only God can perform.

Why is this significant for your work here this summer?

Periodically, you will see a box like this at the end of a day's study. It will ask you a reflective type question about what you hear the Holy Spirit saying to you, what you sense God is saying to you through His word. It is meant to cause you some pause. God wants to speak to us, He wants us to be quiet and listen for Him. Take time daily to ask Him to teach you and to wait to see what He is saying. He is a relational God, He wants relationship with you.

I love this chapter!

Describe how the man is formed by God:

In His creating the atmosphere of the garden- how does God demonstrate His care for man?

What was the man's primary job in the garden?

From verses 16-17 what was an additional responsibility given to the man?

Why was the woman created?

How can both maleness & femaleness be part of "image-bearing"?

How can you tell that Adam liked the woman?

What can you learn about God's character from this chapter?

What can you learn about how we were created to function in relationships from this chapter?

Wednesday: Staff Training

Read Genesis chapter 3

What part of God's character does the serpent question?

How does he lie to Eve?

Why do you think they noticed their nakedness after their sin?

How are Adam & Eve's excuses about their sin similar to ones that you use?

What is the curse for Adam?

For Eve?

Why do you think they are cursed so uniquely?

God sews clothes for Adam & Eve. This is seemingly the first animal that was killed. How does this foreshadow what Christ's death does for us?

Read Genesis chapter 4

What sin is crouching at your door? And how?

What do you think this means?

How does Cain respond to his judgment from God?

Read Hebrews 12:22-24

How does the blood of Jesus speak a better word than Abel's blood?

How is that encouraging to you as you head into serving this summer?

Friday: Staff Training

Read Genesis 4:25- chapter 5

Why do you think that the scripture mentions Seth replacing Abel? What do you think God is hoping for from these two men?

Saturday: Staff Training

We learned yesterday that faith pleases God. Enoch's faith pleased God so much He took him away! Throughout Genesis we are going to have the chance to read the faith stories of many, many people. With each new life- ponder how you can grow in faith, what opportunities can you use to stretch your faith?

Describe people at this time:

How does it impact or hit you to hear that God was filled with pain over His creation?

Why did Noah find favor with God?

Read Psalm 19:13 and define what it means to walk blamelessly:

How is this different from Noah (or you & I) being sinless?

How would this grow their faith?

Imagine seeing all the animals arrive. How would you be feeling?

Monday: Week 1

Read Genesis chapter 8

Retell the events in your own words:

How does the phrase “but God” in verse 1 change the events?

How long has Noah been in the ark?

What is their first response when they exit the ark?

What are some things in your life/events/people that draw you to praise God?

Revelation tells us that our prayers are like incense rising to the Lord. Spend some time right now praising God in prayer.

How have you seen God remember you?

OK- we can't ignore this weird story at the end of the chapter ☺ Why do you think it's included?

What should we be learning from it?

When has there been a time that you made your own mess but God intervened to help?

Pray and ask God to show you where you may be in danger.

What do you feel the Holy Spirit impressing on your heart today?

Saturday & Sunday: Week 1

I have a friend who shared one time how much the phrase "but God..." meant to her. How God steps in to intervene when our situations and hard things can seem insurmountable! We will see that over and over again in Genesis as we read. I thought it would be cool to take today and tomorrow to look up some of these verses. Enjoy!

Monday: Week 2

Read Genesis chapter 14

What do you think Abram is feeling as he heads out to rescue Lot?

What is amazing about this rescue story?

Melchizedek is an interesting character. You can look up references to him in Psalm 110:4 & Hebrews 7:1-4 to see the little that is known about him. He is significant as he functioned as both a king & a priest- giving us a picture of how Jesus would later function. How is Abram honoring God with his choice to accept no gifts from Melchizedek?

Tuesday: Week 2

Read Genesis chapter 15

God reassures Abram in vs. 1 and tells him to not be afraid. What do you think would be making Abram fearful?

Picture being Abram during this amazing conversation with God. What stands out to you?

Abram knows that God has already promised to make him into a great nation. But he cannot figure out how God can do that with Sarai being barren. Does God rebuke Abram for his questions?

How does He respond to him?

How does this encourage you?

In ancient times, two parties would guarantee a covenant by walking through animals cut in half as written here. In effect they were saying; “do to me as has been done to these animals if I do not keep my end of this covenant.” It literally means “to cut a covenant”. As Abram watches, God Himself becomes both parties. In the smoke & the fire God promises Abram that He alone is responsible to honor the covenant He has made.

How is this similar to what is offered to us in relationship with Jesus?

What do we learn about God from this chapter?

Read again Psalm 19:13 and define what it means to be blameless:

This might seem like a strange question- but of all the ways God could have chosen to "mark" Abraham and his descendents as His own- why circumcision?

Picture yourself talking to God face to face- what comes to mind? How do you think His voice sounds? How does He look at you? Incredible to think about, huh?

Reread verse 22- what happens?

Abraham's quick obedience in verse 23 seems to be his pattern.

Are you a quick obeyer when you sense God is asking you to do something?

Stop right now and ask God to help you have a desire to hear His voice clearly and quickly obey. This has been a great prayer for me and keeps me focused on the fact that God is the one in charge (He's the boss). My job is to listen and obey.

What do you hear God saying to you today?

What are some of the amazing things happening in verse 16-19?

Read verse 19- which came first: God choosing or Abraham following?

What is amazing about this conversation?

Why do you think God wants us to pray and dialogue with Him about things that matter to us?

From this passage- do you think God changes His mind about what He is going to do with Sodom?

Wednesday: Week 3

Read Genesis chapter 19

If you haven't read this before- does it surprise you that such a story is in the Bible?

So Lot (that we met in chapters 13 & 14) has apparently moved into this wicked city. Based on this decision what can we surmise about his character?

According to verse 29 why does God spare Lot?

What is sad to you as you read about the decision Lot's daughters make?

Are you aware of any famous Moabites? (If not-read the book of Ruth for a great story☺)

Read Genesis chapter 20
Arghhhh! Another sad story!
Why is this account surprising about
Abraham? What should he know by now?

Why do you think God intervenes again?

In relation to Abraham's covenant with God- why is this such a foolish plan
(saying Sarah was his sister)?

What foolish choice have you made recently?

Have you asked the Lord to intervene and show you His wisdom?

Friday: Week 3

Read Genesis chapter 21

The name Isaac means “he laughs”- why is this an appropriate name in many ways?

What does the birth of Isaac teach us about God?

How do you feel about God’s response to Abraham regarding Ishmael?

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness

Hagar had initially been given to Sarah as her maid and therefore Sarah could dismiss her. But because Sarah had given her to Abraham and she had bore a son she had elevated to the status of a wife and sending her away would be similar to divorcing her though she would gain her freedom as well. What can we learn about Abraham’s character by (1) his distress over sending Ishmael away as well as (2) his prompt obedience to the Lord?

God again comes to comfort & reach out to Hagar. He tells her to not be afraid. What in your life causes you to fear right now?

Have you asked God into this situation and feeling of fear? Where is He at in the midst of it?

Spend some time praying right now.

Saturday: Week 3

Read Genesis chapter 22

From the early verses in the chapter what kind of dad do you think Abraham was to Isaac?

The region of Moriah would be about 3 days journey.

We don't know exactly how old Isaac was- but he was old enough to carry the wood for the fire.

In earlier weeks, I talked about how each new story in Genesis would give us an opportunity to see that person's faith legacy left to us. Where do you see evidence of Abraham's faith in this chapter?

Where can you see evidence of Isaac's faith?

In verse 8 the Hebrew word for 'will provide' is Raah which literally means "to see to" or "to attend to". From Hebrews 11: 17-19 what can we speculate was going on in Abraham's head?

What aspects of God's character do you see in this chapter?

How does the ram ultimately foreshadow what Jesus does on the cross for you & I?

What are you looking for God to provide in your own life right now? Do you think He sees your situation and will provide? (what do you believe about Him)

Sunday- Week 5

In unique ways, both a father and a mother teach & model what it means to be a man or a woman to both sexes of their children. Boys & young men need the influence of both a godly mother and a godly father to develop security and a sense of what it looks like to launch out with impact into the world. In the same ways, both a father and a mother teach a young girl how to respond in trust and an ability to respond to leadership.

God reveals Himself in the scriptures as male. He also shows the *qualities* of both a mother (Isaiah 49:15) and a father (Matthew 6:9 & Romans 8:15).





Ask someone to pray with you about this. I dare you to ask someone.




Moses learned a lot during his exile: he learned desert life, family life, God undistracted. God has a plan for every moment in your life.

Monday- Week 8

Read Exodus chapter 7-10

Many of the plagues confronted a specific Egyptian god.

How does the God of the Israelites demonstrate His supremacy through the plagues?

Why is it a loving thing for God to show He is supreme in this way?

How is it merciful?

In chapter 10 we see Pharaoh's officials give him some good counsel that he ignores.

Do you have people around you that are wise to give you counsel?? How are you at listening to them?

Tuesday- Week 8

Read Exodus chapter 11-12

Explain what happens in this plague and why it happens?

How could the Israelites feel protected and cared for by the Lord throughout this?

How do you feel about what happens?

It's always amazing to me that Pharaoh's heart gets harder and harder. Where is your heart at? Are you soft when the lord teaches you something or someone you know says truth to you?

In what ways is the Passover similar to the Cross?

What is Aaron's sin here?

Why is his response so disappointing?

How do you fashion your own 'god'??

In verse 25, Moses is concerned that the people had become a source of mockery and had reflected poorly on God's name. How has our conduct as a staff been this summer? How do you think we have reflected the Lord?

Doesn't it seem hard to end here in the middle of the story?

We are hoping this spurs you on to continue reading in Exodus and perhaps even through Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy!

Following is some help for that!

Next summer, we will pick up the story of the Israelites as they finally enter the Promised Land- stay tuned and join us to serve and grow next summer!

Closing Thoughts

We hope that you have begun to or have deepened your love of the Lord & the word. Spending time daily is so essential to our growing in our relationship with Christ. It cannot be done without it. We wanted to encourage you to continue on reading, getting up early and spending time with Jesus daily. So we are including a reading plan for the year if you would like to follow along with us! There will be a plan for you to follow so that you can study & dissect each chapter you read. You will be learning to study the bible on your own without any study book!

Basically it will look like this:

Monday: Read the chapter(s) and being to shrink each verse/several verses down to a few words (I will give you an example tomorrow!)

Tuesday: Read the section again and finish shrinking the verses

Wednesday: Divide the chapter(s)/section into smaller chunks/paragraphs and give each a title (oh.. and read the section again)

Thursday: Write out a title for the whole section you have been reading and list the things that struck you when you read- list maybe a verse you want to memorize/something you want to look up further...

Friday: Write out from the passage : 1- things you learned about God the Father/Jesus or the Holy Spirit; 2- things you learned about yourself/mankind; 3- commands for you to obey.

Saturday & Sunday: Read a proverb each day- you will make it through the whole book of Proverbs about 2x before we reconvene for camp next summer! It will start tomorrow on the staff trip and then continue through the Spring- have fun!

It has always been sad for us to see many summer staff, as they leave camp and head back to school, abandon the practice of daily time with Jesus.

Don't be a sluggard this year- grow- seize the days & moments!

Monday- Staff Trip

We are going to work through Exodus 33:7- 34 in the style above.
Take your time, this is a great section!

Here is my example of shrinking a verse down :)

Exodus 33: 7-8

Moses enters Tent of Meeting with questions for God.

33: 9

Cloud comes down while Moses inside the tent.

And so on and so forth :) Proceed!
